



Keep Calm and Ease into Fall

Predictions abound as we enter the final quarter of 2022, and amid rising interest rates and the recession rhetoric, maybe it's just time to acknowledge that the latest Mercury retrograde has procured some <u>hesitancy</u> in the markets (real estate and stocks) this past month. If you haven't heard of this astrological phenomenon, it happens every three to four months and lasts for about three weeks at a time. During retrograde, Mercury moves slower around the sun than the earth does, and some say this is when communication goes haywire and <u>setbacks</u> tend to happen. Maybe this explains September's volatile <u>stock markets</u>? Regardless, read on for some insights...

Real Estate Is Moving

Despite nationwide talk of a housing slump (or even crisis), real estate in NYC is by and far highly localized, and those in the market should assess accordingly. In Manhattan, the <u>luxury real estate</u> market saw late-September contract signings similar to numbers during the pre-pandemic years of 2016 to 2018, according to <u>Olshan Realty's weekly report</u>. At that end, the sale price for an average luxury home in the third quarter was <u>up over 8%</u> from last year, which is impressive considering activity in other markets.

Historically, real estate has been a favorable place to invest during inflationary times, as it's considered a traditional store of value. That said, buying and selling remain active, so for those considering a home purchase—

pricing is proving competitive and negotiable and there's ample opportunity to invest before rates go higher. For sellers, a practical look at the markets and the strengthening dollar can lead to realistic expectations when pricing and negotiating with buyers, ultimately leading to a successfully signed contract.

Rental Prices Are Leveling Off

As they say, what goes up must come down, and nationwide, <u>rents have</u> <u>fallen</u> for the first time in nine months. Looking at Manhattan, August median rents dropped 1.2% from July to \$4,100 and continue to decline. This recent movement in the borough has <u>ended a six-month streak</u> of record-breaking prices, signaling a leveling off and a return to seasonal market patterns.

Interest Rates and Mortgage Rates are Rising

The rising of interest rates has become almost thematic in 2022, with the Fed <u>raising the benchmark rate</u> another 0.75 points at its September meeting. This is the Fed's <u>fifth hike</u> of the year out of an expected <u>seven</u>, bringing the rate to a range of 3-3.25%, which is the highest it's been since 2008. Hikes may continue through 2023, as the Fed has made it clear that it will <u>do</u> <u>whatever it takes</u> to tame inflation, even if that means slowing down the economy and pushing the nation into a recession.

Mortgage rates continue to <u>rise nationwide</u>, causing slowdowns in buying and selling depending on the locale. However, NYC has a large percentage of higher-priced apartments, so buyers who borrow above the conforming amount (\$647,200) are still seeing jumbo rates much lower than one reads about in nationwide news headlines.

Some Things Defy Gravity

Regardless of inflation, interest rates, or a Mercury retrograde, here are a few things you might find refreshing:

- Demand for luxury condos in NYC is bouncing back.
- NYC was named the <u>top financial capital</u> in the world for the fourth year in a row.
- Young professionals, particularly in tech and culinary arts, are <u>buying</u> <u>properties</u> in downtown NYC.




